GENERAL INFORMATION

Program Mission

The mission of the Residency in Ocular Disease Optometry at the Doris Miller Veteran Affairs Medical Center in Waco, Texas is to provide advanced clinical training in a context of service to our nation's Veterans with the emphasis on the management of patients with ocular disease as part of a multidisciplinary team. This allows the resident upon completion of the program to pursue professional opportunities which require a high level of clinical expertise.

Program Goals

The goals of the program include the following:

- Strengthen the resident's clinical skills to gain confidence in working with patients with ocular disease as part of a multidisciplinary team while providing patient-centered care.
- Provide the resident with experience in clinical and didactic teaching as well as the opportunity to integrate knowledge into patient care through evidence-based clinical decision making.
- Engage the resident in scholarly activities such as lectures, presentations, publications, posters and research.

Program Description

The resident will provide optometric care to patients with a diverse range of ocular and neurologic conditions in the Doris Miller VAMC Eye Clinic. The resident will also be exposed to low vision rehabilitation at the Blind Rehabilitation Center on our campus as well as be exposed to the Ophthalmology subspecialties at our parent hospital, Olin E. Teague Veteran Affairs Hospital in Temple, Texas. In the Doris Miller VAMC Eye Clinic, the resident will receive training in the diagnosis and management of a wide variety of ocular disease conditions, including glaucoma, retinal disease, and anterior segment disorders.

Educational Opportunities

The resident will engage in directly supervised patient care experiences in the Eye clinics of the Doris Miller VAMC Eye Clinic and the Olin E. Teague VA hospital. The resident shall participate and earn CE credits during VA sponsored Grand Rounds. The resident shall participate in regular UIW-RSO sponsored Residency Seminars- which afford the chance to participate in case studies, journal reviews, and public speaking. The resident is encouraged to attend continuing education events in the San Antonio area and to attend national optometric conferences. In addition, close interaction with multidisciplinary providers in varied clinical settings provides the resident with enhanced clinical skills and a broadened medical knowledge base.

Certificate of Completion

A certificate of completion will be awarded to the resident upon satisfactory completion of residency requirements. The completion requirements of the program are:

- Successfully complete all the residency program's goals and objectives
- Complete one paper of publishable quality (research paper, literature review, or case report)
- Deliver one presentation on an optometric topic
- Submit all residency evaluation forms (activity logs, exit evaluations, reviews)
- Successfully Complete NBEO Part 1, Part 2, and Part 3
- Obtain licensure in a State, territory, or Commonwealth of the United States, or in the District of Columbia before the completion of the first year of VA residency.

RESIDENCY EXPERIENCE

Ocular Disease Diagnosis and Management

Approximately 80% of the resident's time will be spent in the Eye Clinic of the Doris Miller VAMC. Here the resident will provide comprehensive eye care to a large and diverse population of patients with a high prevalence of ocular and systemic disease.

By the conclusion of the residency program the resident will be eligible to sit for the Advanced Competency in Medical Optometry boards examination given by the National Board of Examiners in Optometry. Pursuing Board Certification in Medical Optometry by the ABCMO is only available to Federal Optometrists and is strongly encouraged for all federal Optometry residents to pursue.

Scholarly Activities

The resident is required to write at least one paper of publishable quality by the end of the residency. The resident is required to make one presentation on an optometric topic. This may take any of several possible forms, including a seminar, continuing education lecture, guest lecture in an optometry course, or a paper or poster presentation at an academic meeting. Residents participate grand rounds and residency seminar programs at the VA hospital and the Rosenberg School of Optometry. The resident will also participate in the education of optometry externs at the VA Hospital.

WORKSITE

Employment Environment

The resident will spend the majority of their time at the Doris Miller VAMC in Waco, Texas as part of the Central Texas Veterans Health Care System (CTVHCS). The Optometry Resident will provide Medical Optometric care with a focus on Ocular Disease management to scheduled and walk in patients Monday through Friday 0730-1600. Equipment, supplies, white coats, and scrubs are provided by VA.

Ambulatory care programs in CTVHCS provide primary care services to eligible veterans in 32 counties throughout Central Texas, including a rural catchment area extending 100 or more miles from Waco. The hospital also consists of a 100-bed community living center and approximately 40 rehabilitation beds. The rehabilitation beds are used by various programs: Wounded Warrior program, drug and alcohol rehabilitation, blind rehabilitation, PTSD rehabilitation, suicide recovery rehabilitation, a women's only PTSD rehabilitation program, and mental health inpatient stays.

Employment Benefits

The resident receives employment benefits as an employee of the Department of Veteran Affairs. These include health insurance, life insurance, professional liability protection, paid vacation, paid holidays and paid sick leave.

Residents are eligible for the Federal Employee Health Benefits Program <https://www.opm.gov/healthcare-insurance/healthcare/>

Leave benefits consist of thirteen days earned of annual leave plus thirteen days earned of sick leave. Any unused annual leave at the end of the training year will be issued back to the residency as earned income.

Residents are also provided eleven federal holidays during the residency year.

The Federal Tort Claims Act provides the resident with professional liability protection while providing patient care as a component of the residency.

Residents can attend continuing education sponsored by the Rosenberg School of Optometry and the Veterans Health Administration at no charge for credit hours and are provided time to do so.

In addition, residents are often eligible to apply for travel funds or scholarships from various sources.

Eligibility Criteria for Completion of the Program

1. Candidates must earn the degree of Doctor of Optometry from a school or college of optometry accredited by the Accreditation Council on Optometric Education prior to the starting date of the residency.
2. Successful completion of parts 1, 2, and 3 of the NBEO examinations.
3. Candidates must be eligible to be licensed as a therapeutic optometrist in the State of Texas.
4. Candidates must be a US citizen.
5. Successfully complete all the residency program's goals and objectives
6. Complete one paper of publishable quality (research paper, literature review, or case report)
7. Deliver one presentation on an optometric topic
8. Submit all residency evaluation forms (activity logs, exit evaluations, reviews)
9. Obtain licensure in a State, territory, or Commonwealth of the United States, or in the District of Columbia before the completion of the first year of VA residency.
